## Cabinetmakers

Establishing a home in the early days of Brooke County was not easy. It required strong backs and willing hands. Sometimes carpenters doubled as cabinetmakers. Most cabins were furnished with a large plank table, a few crude chairs or stools, and a rope bed. A few pewter dishes, and iron pots, wooden bowls, trenchers, and noggins, looms for weaving, spinning wheels and reels completed the most common items of household goods. A few women might have managed to bring one or two good pieces of china and silver with them from the East, but these would be used only on very special occasions.

Obviously, carpenters and cabinetmakers were indispensable in such a society. These early artisans combined their talents: designed buildings/houses, constructed them, designed and fashioned the furnishings. Later carpenters and cabinetmakers branched out into merchandising. They operated general stores and furniture stores (often in connection with an undertaking business). Others became known for their specialties: clocks, blacksmith bellows, making of wooden machine parts, chairs, violins, restoring antiques, and handcrafting small items of wood.

Records show that Elijah Cole bought property between Eight and Ninth streets on Main in Charleston, Virginia, on July 4, 1794, where he established a carpenter shop. John Brown, father-in-law of Alexander Cambell, was one of the early Brooke County cabinetmakers. Isaac T. Duval and his nephew, William Duval, glassmakers, were fine cabinetmakers and carpenters. The latter operated a warehouse and advertised that he had "a neat hearse and fine coffins for sale." About 1840, Alfred W. Plattenburg took over the Duval business; besides the usual household furniture, he made venetian blinds to order.

In 1794 Patrick Gass apprenticed himself for two years and three months at Mercersburg, Pennsylvania, to learn the carpenter's trade. A cabin he built on the northwest corner of Tenth and Main streets in Charlestone, Virginia, (later covered with clapboard and with rooms added) stands today. The "remodeled cabin" known as The Traveler's Rest and The Yellow Hammer Nest may refer to inns operated by subsequent owners.

In 1826 Samuel Marks opened a furniture factory located between Seventh and Eighth on Charles Street. In the 1840s the firm added another family member when captain Thomas Park joined his uncle, Samuel Marks. In 1865 T.H. Marks joined his father and uncle; they moved the business to the corner of Eighth and Main streets. This remained a Marks family business for more than a century.

Another family firm, William Lloyd and son John, operated a chairmaking factory and an undertaking establishment (1820s until the late 1870s). Son John was joined by Hugh Barth, a native of Wuttemberg, Germany, who came to Brooke County via Pittsburgh. A bookcase in the Brooke County Historical Museum was one made by Lloyd and Barth of Wellsburg probably in the 1860s. In 1866 Barth opened a general store. His descendants carry on a family business today in downtown Wellsburg.

John Moran, a native of Washington County, Pennsylvania, apprenticed himself in 1796 at the age of fourteen to cabinetmaker McConnel to learn his trade. Later Mr. Moran built the General I.H. Duval house on Pleasant Avenue (now the Charles Bell Home). An impressive walnut secretary-desk, a Moran original, is one of the furnishings of the Bell home.

Between 1830 and 1870 these three names appear in the record: Alfred Craft and his father who started their business in Bethany and later moved to Wellsburg. Their shop located on the south side of Twelfth Street specialized in tables, chairs, and cabinets; the Crafts also built homes in the area. Thomas McCarty, who specialized in clockmaking, worked in Wellsburg from the 1820s through the 1870s.

B. Crawford made a plaque of seventy-six varieties of native West Virginia wood for the Philadelphia Exposition of 1876. This plaque, which received "Honorable Mention," was presented to the Brooke County Historical Museum by his niece, Mrs. Martha Hall Bender of Norfolk, Virginia. Later Mr. Crawford moved his shop to his home on Tenth Street; this house stands today.

## The Civil War

No attempt will be made to give a history of the war or the formation of the state of West Virginia. This has been a thoroughly covered in many books and articles, but we will try to give the history of the men and companies serving from Brooke County.

There were no military organizations at Wellsburg until after the secession when the "Home Guard" was organized under Major W. H. Harvey. By the end of May 1861, two companies were formed for a three-month tour of duty. The roster of which follows:

Company F, First Virginia Infantry, mustered into service on May 14, 1861, by Major Oakes at Wheeling Island:

By the middle of May both companies were in camp on Wheeling Island. These men had enlisted for three months and were discharged after their enlistment was up.

In September 1861, there was a call for a regiment and this was the beginning of the first Virginia Infantry.

I. H. Duval was appointed major of the First Virginia Volunteer Infantry on May 29, 1861, and was connected with this regiment until his promotion to colonel in the Ninth West Virginia Infantry. He continued receiving promotions from time to time up to major general by brevet.

The only information that I could find was a Death Certificate for Mary Plattenburg who died on July 29, 1860, at the age of 90. The only other information on the certificate was that she died of old age, was born in Maryland and was the wife of George.

As you already know, the Will of George Plattenburg is on record here. Our marriages go back to 1797, but I did not see any record of their marriage. Our birth and death records only go back to 1853.

## THE PLATTENBURG ROOTS

**JOHANNES GEORG PLATTENBERGER\*** and wife Anna Martha they had 6 children **JOHANNES GEORG JR**, Elisabetha Catharina, Johann Christian, Susanna Johannet, Adelheid Elisabetha, They lived north east of Zweibruecken, West Germany and were members of Lutheran Parish of Ulmet. They left for America and may have used the Glan River, Sarr River and Rhine River to reach Rotterdam. They set sail September 1743 for the United States on the a ship entitled Lydia with Captain James Abercrombie. They reached Philadelphia Pa. and settled in Berks Co. Pa., and it was recorded that **JOHANNES GEORG JR**. was 22

**JOHANNES GEORG PLATTENBERGER JR**, of Berks Co. Pa., had 7 children Joh. Michael 9 Nov. 1761, **JOH. GEORG** 20 Mar. 1765, Anna Barbara 28 Dec. 1766, Eva Margareth 15 Jan. 1769, Johannes 8 Oct 1770, Joh. Peter 24 Dec. 1773, & Catharina 14 July 1777.

One of the first Plattenberger\*\* to appear in the Maryland 1800 U.S. Federal Census Index was **JOH. GEORGE PLATTENBURG** from Anne Arundel County Maryland. George moved to Brooke County West Virginia his wife name was Mary she lived to be 90 died July 29, 1860. The children named in his will are Jacob Plattenburg, **JOHN PLATTENBURG** and Mary Plattenburg recorded Nov. term 1890.

**JOHN PATTENBURG** was born 1800 in Anne Arundel County, Maryland. John married Ellen, who was born in 1810, and together has there sons and two daughters. The children names were; Mary J., born 1829; Adelaida, born 1833; **JOHN W.**, born 1840; Henry C., born 1843; and George, born 1849. John was a tailor and records show that his real estate value was 1,763 dollars. John died on Oct 11, 1855 buried at Brooke County cemetery Virginia (now WV) Panhandle.

**JOHN W. PLATTENBURGH\*\*\*** born July 25, 1840, in Virginia. John entered into the Civil War on September 5, 1861, and served as a Private C Co. in the First Virginia Infantry till the end of the war, July 19, 1865. After the war John moved to Ohio and married Catherine Strouse on September 14, 1867, at Seneca County, Ohio. Catherine was better known as Kate and she was born on February 7, 1843. Almost nine months to the day of their marriage, Catherine gave birth to a son, **JOHN ISAAC PLATTENBURG**, born May 12, 1868, in Tiffin, Ohio. \*\*\*\* In October 1885, John and family purchased 110 acres for 890 dollars in Franklin County, Tennessee and relocated there. (Deed Book 3, page 165) They also had two additional children, a daughter named Addie M. and a son named Pearl. John W. Plattenburg died on February 3, 1896, and is buried at Belvedere United Church of Christ Belvidere, Tennessee. He lived 55 years, 6 months, and 7 days.

\*\*\*\* John Kaserman, a Swiss immigrant and Union veteran, was looking for a place in the south to relocate. After looking at seven states in the south he settled close to Belvidere Tn. in 1868, which means "beautiful view." John Kaserman promoted a widespread settlement of German and Swiss families from several Northern states.

Catherine "Kate" Plattenburg purchased 47 acres on the Huntsville Road (otherwise known as Old Stagecoach Road) north of Huntland, Tennessee for 100 dollars on December 15, 1897.

**JOHN ISAAC PLATTENBURG** married Annie Young in April 1893. They had a son Levert, born March 24, 1894, a daughter, Hettie, born September 27, 1896, in Winchester, Tennessee. John Isaac and Annie had two Additional sons born at their Huntsville Road home. Their names were John Wesley, born March 21, 1899 and Hugh Lestrange, born February 10, 1902. John Isaac bought 47 acres on Huntsville Rd. for 350 dollars from Catherine "Kate." Catherine "Kate" and her children, Addie and Peal, had moved to Chicago, Illinois before this transaction occurred. Kate died in Chicago on March 22, 1926. John Issac and Annie moved to the Lynchburg Road on the south side across from Plattenburg Street in Winchester, Tennessee after 1903 and later built at 309 North Cedar Street. John Isaac Plattenburg died on March 29, was buried on Friday, March 30th at Winchester, and lived 50 years, 10 months, and 7 days.

**HUGH LESTRANGE PLATTENBURG** graduated from Central High School Winchester, Tennessee in 1920. On May 25, 1925 in Fayetteville, Tennessee, he married Lillie Page Snoddy of Kelso, Tennessee. Hugh's was employed as a mail carrier in Winchester and typically walked 14 miles a day on his mail route. In the evenings he delivered packages by car. In 1937, Hugh and Lillie purchased the Country Club and associated land and remodeled it for their home. They lived there until 1954, then they established residence on North Jefferson Street, Winchester, Tennessee. Hugh and Lillie had three children; Hughlene Mildred, born April 26, 1927; Mary Ann, born July 28, 1930; and **STANLEY MILLER**, born October 8, 1935. After retirement from postal service, Hugh sold Real Estate. He died January 1, 1974 of a massive heart attack.

**STANLEY MILLER PLATTENBURG** was born in a house on North West Second Ave. in Winchester, Tennessee. Stanley graduated from Franklin County High School in 1954 and afterwards attended Middle Tennessee State University. He later met and married Shirley May Bishop of Huntland, Tennessee on Nov. 25, 1959. They had one daughter named Sonya Marie Sisk which was born on July 30, 1964 in Huntsville, Alabama. Stanley was employed by NASA for 34 years. After retiring, on November 30, 1990, he worked for McDonald Douglas and Micro Craft for short periods of time. Stanley is now permanently retired and lives at 6627 Highway 72 West, Huntsville, Alabama.
